April 10 Showcase – T.M. Hanna

Thomas Michael Hanna disappeared from the small western Pennsylvania village of his birth many years ago. The locals still talk, of course, about the lad with a penchant for good-natured mischief, Vernor's ginger ale, and girls. Oh, and music, too, let's not forget that.

"TM," as he came to be called, started playing and writing songs very early, but nobody could figure out where he got his inspiration. In a bucolic village of less than 100 people, with hills and valleys and woods and creeks all over, he seemed to channel a different universe. Folks marveled at TM's bent for banging on bongos and singing surf songs, like he was an alien plopped into their midst. Well, perhaps "marveled" is the wrong word, a tad euphemistic for the actual reaction. TM found it easier to remove himself to more private places to tinitinnabulate and extol the atolls, places where his family and neighbors wouldn't hear him. Initially this was out in the woods around the town, where he could furtively pursue his art. On one of these outings he stumbled upon someone else's remote spot for furtive activity, a clandestine stash of, um, well, "art" magazines – he wrote a song about it, of course... but we digress.

TM soon began exploring the world far beyond the village, and has seen most of this country up close. He's tinkered at playing almost every instrument imaginable, but has settled on the mandolin as his ace axe. His musical tastes have expanded, too - he's got a remarkable knowledge of Pop and Folk musicology, especially about American songwriters of the last 200 years. Mention a song, and he'll know all about its writer and recording history. To top it off, he's a witty stand-up comedian for the patter between songs.

Over the years, TM has performed with a variety of groups, like the Justis League, the Space Time Gourmets, the Mad Cows, and the Porch Monkeys. He's played all over, including the Avalon, Country Roads, and Cherry Blossom Festivals, but keeps coming back to the Folk Club because it's the only place where his eccentricities are overshadowed by everyone else's, and the challenge to rise to our level is inspiring.

TM works at Melody Music in Sterling, teaching harmonica, banjo, and mandolin as well as guiding customers through sundry musical paraphernalia.

For the showcase, TM's partners in crime at press time are likely to be Al Bernier and Harny (Ken Harnage), with backing vocals by Jane Tatum and Fang (Chris Harnage).

of its own. Audiences are encouraged to clog along, or dance Breton line dances, and join in singing. Celebrating its 20th anniversary, IONA has existed since 1986, and has evolved into one of the top rated pan-Celtic groups in the world. Co-founded by Barbara Tresidder Ryan (lead vocals, Celtic bouzouki, guitars and bodhrán) and Bernard Argent (wooden flute, whistles, doumbek, back-up vocals), IONA now claims one of the most exciting young American fiddlers, Andrew Dodds. Rounding out the line up is Chuck Lawhorn on 6-string bass guitar, whistles and vocals. IONA has released nine albums, the most recent of which, A Celebration of Twenty, is a commemorative double CD package.

IONA's music is a unique, acoustic weave of the traditional music of Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cornwall, Brittany (France), the Isle of Man and Galicia (Spain). Blending songs, dance tunes, and aires into a rich and stunning tapestry, their style is outstanding in an arena where these traditions are seldom intertwined.

Hank Williams Lost notebook in Limbo

Last fall, a notebook of lost songs by Hank Williams surfaced when Nashville collector **Steven Shutts** finished authenticating a discarded notebook from a box of items that had been thrown out from a Sony/ATV office. In October 2006, Sony/ATV filed suit, claiming the item had been stolen by **Francine Boykin**, a member of the cleaning staff.

Early last month a judge ruled that there was insufficient evidence to support the theft charges. A civil suit is now pending to determine ownership of the notebook.

The notebook contains handwritten lyrics to 17 never-recorded songs penned by Williams between 1947 and 1949, including *Tomorrow May Not Come, I Wish I had a Dad*, and *Honky Tonkin' Mama*.

Purchased by Shutts for \$1500, the notebook is believed to be worth several hundred thousand dollars, though is no doubt considered priceless to avid Williams fans.
