July 10 Showcase – Jane Tatum

Overcoming Artistic ADD by Jane

Writers are the backbone of most great art for me. Playwrights, poets, novelists, essayists, and especially songwriters are responsible for the script and sound track of my life, and the wallpaper that decorates the interior of my mind on most any day.

I've been singing in public for probably 50 years and playing guitar for over 40, and the older I get and the more songs I learn, the more respect I have for songwriters. In my younger years I listened to, and mimicked, Johnny Cash, Buddy Holly, Fats Domino, and Elvis, as my father had a fairly extensive collection of 45s that were played frequently in our home. Over the 50's, 60's, and 70's, I listened to folk, Motown, and rock and roll. In the early 80's country music grew on me, and since then I've been drawn to roots music, including Appalachian traditional, bluegrass, and blues. All of that rolls around inside, and comes out in some rather strange configurations at times. It is difficult to say I have a favorite, but choosing favorites is always easier when I focus on a song and songwriter.

For this showcase, I'm trying to overcome my musical Attention Deficit Disorder and focus on one writer-Kris Kristofferson. Just in time for a retrospective of his work to be released this month, I'll do a showcase featuring his songs. I've loved his work for the whole span of his career, in which he has been covered by over 450 artists and won three Grammies. He has had seventeen Top 40 albums, and has appeared in more than 100 films, documentaries, and television programs. In April of 2007, Rosanne Cash presented him with CMT's Johnny Cash Visionary Award, noting the authenticity of his work by saying that "He is his art, and his art is him." In a song Kris wrote for a 2006 recording, he ended with the words Guy Clark said to him when he was going out on stage one night: "Go break a heart," instead of the standard "Go break a leg."

I don't think I'm gonna break any hearts, but I'll do my best to reflect the passion and depth of his words and work. I'll be joined by the Folk Club's favorite interpreter of traditional country songs, Don Rembert, as well as by one of our own favorite songwriters, TM Hanna. Hope you can join us!!

Jane Tatum lives in Reston and performs regularly at the Folk Club. She will also be performing on Friday, July 6, for an ice cream social at the Washington Plaza Baptist Church on Lake Anne in Reston, with Donna Xander on banjo and Jim Nagle on Dobro.

Jane is also a member of Laurel Branch, a quartet that includes Sara Collier, Ann Caldwell, and the newest member, Julia Sparks. Laurel Branch performed in early June at the 4th Annual Granville Johnson Bluegrass Festival in North Vernon, IN. They will be opening for the Island Bluegrass Alliance's concert for Newfound Road on August 11 in Chincoteague, VA, and will perform for the third year in a row at the Bluemont Fair in September. Jane's two recordings, *How Sweet the Sound* (2001) and *Rehearsing for the Big One* (2005), will be available at the showcase

"Rural Rockwell" – Willard Gayheart

Pencil artist Willard Gayheart was born in Cordia, Kentucky (just outside of Hazard) on June 5, 1932. Since childhood, his love of the mountains, people and culture of the Southern Appalachian region has never wavered, and has inspired him to produce an outstanding body of art. His works have been widely acclaimed for the character and life he instills in each picture.


In high school, Willard's creative energies were channeled into music when he managed to save up enough money to buy a \$3.00 used guitar. He quickly learned many of the traditional folk songs of the region (and eventually began






writing songs himself). In the past, he has been a member of the noted bluegrass band **The Highlanders**, a newer group called **Alternate Roots**, and most recently with the **Grassy Hollow Band**, going back to his beloved old-time mountain music. This deep love of music has been the inspiration for many of his pencil drawings. His more notable subjects have included **Doc** and **Merle Watson**, **Bill Monroe**, and **Wayne Henderson**, but he also likes to draw pictures of average people enjoying and playing music (as well as other activities.) He captures images depicting folks in their natural surroundings and endeavors, and imbues them with a reality that allows the viewer to hear the sounds and smell the atmosphere of the scene.

Given his innate creative talents, it is interesting to note that many people were not aware of his artistic abilities until he donated two pencil sketches for a church sale in 1974. After they sold so quickly, he realized that he had not paid attention to how good his work was becoming. As Gayheart himself later said, "I really surprised myself." After that, he started to devote more of his time to his artwork, drawing family members, and taking on commissioned work. By this time, Willard had moved to Woodlawn, Virginia (just outside of Galax), where he and his son own an art and framing shop. Though his son handles most of the day-to-day operations, Willard may pop in from time to time. January 2004 saw the publication of his book, *Appalachian Artist*, co-authored by Donia Eley. The book is volume nine in a series by MacFarland Publishers entitled "Contributions to Southern Appalachian Studies."





I met Willard in 1999 while on a trip to a family reunion, and had the pleasure to spend a couple of hours with him at his home, where he was delighted to show off his collection of autoharps, as well as the custom-made Wayne Henderson guitar he had acquired in trade for the original artwork of a montage of Wayne's shop. You could not ask to meet a more kindly and down-to-earth gentleman, and I came away with the impression that he had genuinely enjoyed the visit as much as I.

If you get down to Galax this summer, stop by the Blue Ridge Music Center on any Tuesday. Willard will be performing throughout the day from 10AM-4PM with his good friend (and local music producer) Bobby Patterson. You can get more info at http://www.blueridgemusiccenter.org/

Hall of Fame Commemorates Bristol Sessions

The 80th anniversary of the Bristol Sessions will be commemorated with an exhibit beginning June 28 at the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum in Nashville. Jimmie Rodgers and the Carter Family were first recorded during the 1927 Bristol Sessions, which are considered the origin of Country music. Highlights of the exhibit include the Carter Family's first recording (a 78-rpm disc of "The Poor Orphan Child," backed with "The Wandering Boy") and Rodgers' Underwood Standard typewriter, which he used to type lyric sheets for use during his recording sessions.
