September 12 – T.M. Hanna

Thomas Michael Hanna disappeared from the small western Pennsylvania village of his birth many years ago. The locals still talk, of course, about the lad with a penchant for good-natured mischief, Vernor's ginger ale, and girls. Oh, and music, too, let's not forget that.

"TM." as he came to be called, started playing and writing songs very early, but nobody could figure out where he got his inspiration. In a bucolic village of less than 100 people, with hills and valleys and woods and creeks all over, he seemed to channel a different universe. Folks marveled at TM's bent for banging on bongos and singing surf songs, like he was an alien plopped into their midst. Well, perhaps "marveled" is the wrong word, a tad euphemistic for the actual reaction. TM found it easier to remove himself to more private places to tinitinnabulate and extol the atolls, places where his family and neighbors wouldn't hear him. Initially this was out in the woods around the town, where he could furtively pursue his art. On one of these outings he stumbled upon someone else's remote spot for furtive activity, a clandestine stash of, um, well, "art" magazines – he wrote a song about it, of course. Maybe he'll do it for the showcase,

with bongos and Dick Dale surf guitar for accompaniment... but we digress.

TM soon began exploring the world far beyond the village, and has seen most of this country up close. He's tinkered at playing almost every instrument imaginable, but has settled on the mandolin as his ace axe. His musical tastes have expanded, too - he's got a remarkable knowledge of Pop and Folk musicology, especially about American songwriters of the last 200 years. Mention a song, and he'll know all about its writer and recording history. To top it off, he's a witty stand-up comedian for the patter between songs.


Over the years, TM has performed with a variety of groups, like the Justis League, the Space Time Gourmets, the Mad Cows, and the Porch Monkeys. He's played all over, but keeps coming back to the Folk Club because it's the only place where his eccentricities are overshadowed by everyone else's, and the challenge to rise to our level is inspiring.

TM has been working at Melody Music in Sterling for the last year or so, teaching harmonica, banjo, and mandolin as well as guiding customers through sundry musical paraphernalia. He also helps out with Big Bear Productions, Scott Twiford's live sound company, and just finished running sound for the Avalon Folk Festival. Those of you who were there saw a part of TM that few have ever seen – his upper lip! Yes, to ward off the heat at the festival, he cut his hair and shaved. That lip hasn't been seen in 30 years, and it just may be coaxed into an appearance at the showcase, too... ya gotta be there to find out!

Lee Murdock has uncovered a boundless body of music and stories in the Great Lakes. There is an amazing timelessness in this music. Great Lakes songs are made of hard word, hard living, ships that go down and ships that come in. The music is grounded in the work song tradition, from the rugged days of lumberjacks and wooden sailing schooners. Murdock comes alongside with ballads of contemporary commerce and revelry in the grand folk style. Lee's fans have discovered a sweet water treasure in his songs about the Great Lakes, finding drama and inspiration in the lives of sailors and fishermen, lighthouse keepers, ghosts, shipwrecks, outlaws and everyday heroes. With a deeper under-standing of the folk process, Lee's repertoire combines historical research and contemporary insights. Making folk music for the modern era. Lee Murdock's work is a documentary and also an anthem to the people who live, work, learn and play along the shores of the Great Lakes today. Lee Murdock began his performing career in the Chicago area in the mid 1970's, expanding his repertoire of blues and popular music as his interest in folk music and the maritime tradition grew. Interestingly, it was a one-week residency with the Philadelphia Folksong Society which first linked Lee's musical identity with the Great Lakes. After a week of in-school performances which they sponsored, Lee took their enthusiastic response to heart, and

has been taking his Great Lakes music programs to school children and adult and family concerts ever since. Educational programs continue to be one important aspect of the 150 shows Lee presents every year in the U.S. and Canada.
