October 17 Showcase – Jim Nagle by Dan Grove

Jim Nagle has lived around here most of his life, with a side trip to the Florida Institute of Technology after graduating from Herndon High School. As a young biology graduate, he did environmental work, and then switched to DNA sequencing in the 1980s. For the past 15 years he's worked at the National Institutes of Health, including a stint in the lab of Craig Venter of human genome fame, and now manages the NINDS/NIMH sequencing facility.

In his spare time, Jim does athletics, including many Reston Triathlons, Marine Corps Marathons, Boston Marathons, and JFK 50-Mile Races (it takes 9-10 hours to run that far; his best marathon time is 3:08). He raced motocross in the expert class when younger, and still rides on the road – he just added a 2005 BMW R1200ST to the classic 1974 BMW in his garage. His wife Lynn and daughters Antonia (almost 10) and Jacqui (9) keep him busy, too. But he still somehow finds time for another true love, and that's music.

Jim got his first guitar at age ten, about the same time he went to a music-based summer camp, and then took lessons for several years. He's always returned to music, even though events have managed to pull him away occasionally. Jim has explored many guitar styles, both acoustic and electric, including fingerpicking, flatpicking, Grateful Dead-type jamming, and Dobro. Guitar teachers over the years have included Glen Kuykendall of Bluegrass Unlimited Magazine in Warrenton, and Mike Auldridge of the Seldom Scene. His early musical influences run from the Beatles, Beach Boys, Byrds, Rascals, Who, Dead, Little Feat, Stones, and Jethro Tull thru Tim O'Brien and his all-time biggest hero, Dobro star Jerry Douglas. Dobro and lap-style guitar are particular interests of Jim's, and this year he hosted his first house concert, featuring resonator man Mike Esposito.

For the showcase, Jim will do mostly all new material, with only one song that he's performed at the club before. Jane Tatum and doghouse bass player Jared Creason will join him, with cameos by dangerous banjo and fiddle players (rumored to be **Donna Xander** and **Chelle Fulk**). Jim very much appreciates the Folk Club and the opportunities it provides. Come share his love of music!



Where Are They Now? –Batdorf and Rodney



Having grown up separately in the Los Angeles area during the '60s, John Batdorf and Mark Rodney didn't meet until the summer of 1970, after they had both individually moved to Las Vegas. John had previously played with a few bands in the L.A. area, during which time he'd had the opportunity to meet Atlantic Records president Ahmet Ertegun. He was working in a coffee house on the UNLV campus and performing music in the evenings. Mark, who had grown up with jazz influences and attended the Berkelee School of Music in Boston, was living with his father, the Charlie Parker-style horn player, Red Rodney. As a teenager, he'd played and jammed with numerous bands and celebrities in the L.A. area, including the original The Blues Image

(remember 'Ride, Captain Ride'?) and Jimi Hendrix.

One night, Mark showed up at the coffee house, after having been informed by his younger brother that he really had to check out this fellow playing on campus. During a break, Mark introduced himself and asked if he could sit in on the next set. They both liked what they were hearing, and started practicing together every day. By autumn, they decided to record some demos, and moved back to L.A. to see what they could make happen. John managed to contact Ahmet Ertegun at his hotel, and after the audition he immediately signed them to Atlantic Records. They recorded three albums together over the next several years, but never gathered the national recognition they needed to keep their momentum.



Today John is keeping his musical career alive. He's recorded

several albums over the years since Batdorf and Rodney dissolved, with artists such as Michael McLean and John Lee Stanley, as well as a recent solo EP of 5 original pieces. He has also scored original music for TV, including pieces for the shows "Promised Land" and "Touched by an Angel". Mark returned to acting in 1980, and has had numerous parts on TV and in the movies (including a few extra parts in "Ocean's 11"). He still plays in a jazz trio occasionally, and is a DJ for KUNV radio, the NPR station in the Las Vegas area. John and Mark are planning to reconnect soon for a CD project that should be released early next year.

While their music showed influences of CSNY, Simon and Garfunkel, and James Taylor, Batdorf and Rodney carved out their own niche with an upbeat style that showcased not only their tremendous vocal harmonies, but their blending of popular acoustic hooks with an instrumental flair. They preceded such later acts as America, Dan Fogelburg, and Seals and Crofts, and no doubt influenced them as well.

Etta Baker Passes

Etta Baker, the influential Piedmont-style blues guitarist, passed away on September 23 while visiting a daughter in Fairfax, Virginia who had recently suffered a stroke. Having come to the attention of the public after her appearance on the 1950's recording "*Instrumental Music of the Southern Appalachians*", she didn't turn professional until she was 60 years old and only stopped playing guitar last year due to failing health. Her last recording was in 2004 with Taj Mahal, who was inspired by her ever since hearing her earlier recordings in the 60's. She will also be heard on Kenny Wayne Shepherd's upcoming album "10 Days Out (Blues From the Blackroad)".

To be in the Showcase you must: 1) be a Folk Club member who has not done a showcase in the last 6 months; 2) fill out a lottery slip and place it in the "drawing bucket"; 3) Win the drawing on the night of the current month's showcase; and 4) be prepared to be featured in the next newsletter!
