

November 8 Showcase – Larry Mediate (with Ben Hamblin - *The Two Tenors* in Concert) by Dan Grove

Larry Mediate joined the Folk Club back about 1986, when it met at Jonathan's Keep in Reston. He'd heard about it from Mark Elliott and Marty Ottobre, two even earlier club members. Larry's probably the first of what are now quite a few club marriages - he met his wife Beverly at one of those early sessions, and they're now celebrating their 18th anniversary! Larry was club President for six years in the early 90's, and owned a music store back then, too. His tenor voice was a fixture at the club during those early years.

A new career in telecom demanded more time, though, and Larry became less active. He worked at UUNet, which changed into WorldCom, then MCI, and now Verizon, where he manages Internet technical support. We hope Verizon Internet connections don't suffer, but we're more than happy to have one of the club stalwarts back!

For the showcase, Larry will do songs by Neal Young, the Eagles, Bob Seger, and Eric Clapton, plus an original, and he's asked **Ben Hamblin** to join him on stage. Ben and his wife **Gail** left New England nine years ago, eager to escape the winters. Ben works at Raytheon, and he's also one of the club's sound engineers. He was a tenor for the Massachusetts All-State Chorus in high school, and can still sing as high now as he could then. Larry can get up there, too, so the two tenors are preparing to soar together. This is not a contest, however, and no one-upmanship, pitch-wise, is anticipated. We'd like to remind all club members that wagering on which man hits the highest note during the show is frowned upon.

Terry Leonino and Greg Artzner began to play music together in Kent, Ohio in September of 1973. They chose the name Magpie for their band, a name which grew in personal significance for them as years went by. Terry was a student in her senior year at Kent State University in the fall of '73, and when she graduated the following spring, she and Greg packed Greg's VW bus and moved to the Washington, DC area. In the years since then, they have traveled and toured extensively, performed in concerts, at folk clubs and festivals around the world, and recorded Terry's voice is a truly impressive many times. instrument, not only because of its natural power, but also because of her versatility. She is a gifted singer of jazz and blues in the tradition of Connie Boswell and Billie Holiday, but is equally comfortable with the subtle beauty

of traditional folk and contemporary songs. Add to this her uncanny ability to find the perfect harmony line, and, in a powerful blend of their two voices, you have a real treat for the ear. As if this weren't enough, Terry is also an excellent player of the harmonica, mandolin, fretted dulcimer, and rhythm guitar. Greg is an outstanding guitarist whose fingerstyle approach owes a lot to his heroes, guitar legends such as Reverend Gary Davis, Big Bill Broonzy, Nick Lucas, Phil Ochs, and Rolly Brown. His playing is the solid basis of Magpie's sound, providing whatever is called for, whether it be a hard-driving rhythm, or a ringing lyrical beauty. From a slow Scots air or a plaintive ballad to a rollicking ragtime blues or infectious swing, Greg covers it all. His high baritone voice has equal range and his captivating interpretation gives power and beauty to the full spectrum, from growling blues, to a Chilean lament, to a sweet croon. From the beginning Terry and Greg's interests in various musical styles have led them to be eclectic in their repertoire. Rather than confine themselves to a single style, Magpie has always embraced a musical rainbow, and with impressive proficiency in each different genre. From traditional, classic country, swing, and blues of the nineteen twenties and thirties, to contemporary songs written by themselves and others, Terry and Greg cover a lot of musical ground. They are the 1998 WAMMIE award winning best Traditional Folk Duo or Group.

Patsy Cline Honored

Patsy Cline's home in Winchester, Virginia, which has been a favorite stop for country music fans for years, is finally being recognized by Virginia as an official landmark.

Patsy lived in the house at 608 South Kent St. from age 16 to 21, then off and on again through 1957. The home was listed this month on the Virginia Landmarks Register. It also has been proposed for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places.

Johnny Cash on Broadway, TV and in the Movies

"*Ring of Fire*" a new musical review based on the life and music of the Man in Black, is due to start performances at the Ethel Barrymore Theater in New York City in February 2006. Featuring such Cash standards as "I Walk the Line," "Folsom Prison Blues," "A Boy Named Sue" and "Daddy Sang Bass", the show doesn't put Cash on stage but instead creates an impressionistic picture of the man, his music and the times in which he lived.

The show is directed by Richard Maltby, Jr., who won a Tony award for his groundbreaking 1978 revue, "*Ain't Misbehavin'*," based on the music of Fats Waller. The debut performances were held recently in Buffalo, NY, and the show is slated to appear in San Francisco before reaching Broadway early next year.

There are also two other Cash projects of note coming up. First, an entertainment special called "*I Walk The Line: A Night for Johnny Cash*" is being taped for broadcast November 16 on CBS at 8:00pm EST. Music will be performed by artists who have been influenced by Johnny's music, and will include an eclectic mix of performers from the likes of Jerry Lee Lewis to The Foo Fighters, and many, many more.

Among the stars who will be introducing the acts are Joaquin Phoenix and Reese Witherspoon, who play Johnny Cash and June Carter Cash in the upcoming movie "*Walk The Line*," which opens in theaters on November 18.

Dulcimer or Scheitholt? Ask Ralph Lee Smith

Folk Club member Ralph Lee Smith recently opened an exhibit at the Museum of the Shenandoah Valley entitled "A Tale of Two Cultures: How the German Scheitholt Became the American Dulcimer." The exhibit details how the modern dulcimer (in all its forms) evolved from the earlier German instrument brought to the new world by immigrants in the early 1700s. The exhibit runs through June 2006, and showcases 17 of Ralph's various dulcimers and Scheitholts. Visit the museum's website


