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November 11 Showcase – Mike Ball by Mike

There are those who will tell you Mike Ball is something of a Renaissance man. There are also those who would tell you he was born during the Renaissance. With the exception of not being able to play a first position B-flat chord on the guitar, there are few things he won't at least try.

A native Baltimorean, Mike roamed the East Coast in his youth—from Maryland, to New Jersey, to Florida, to South Carolina and to New York. Rumors that these moves were due to what has become known as the Aberdeen Incident are completely false. After showing some early promise in baseball and football; in high school, Mike's athletic interest turned toward pole vaulting. Unfortunately, he literally peaked early in life and it has been downhill ever since.

After high school, Mike and his buddy Leo built a raft to float down the Mississippi River. Starting at Lake Itasca they abandoned the leaking vessel in St. Paul and hitchhiked to Key West. Details of this trip remain sketchy and any statutes of limitation have long since expired. To earn a (mostly) honest dollar he turned his hand toward crabbing, making gaskets in a factory, apprenticed as a Tupperware repairman and drove nails as a carpenter. He holds the distinction of being the only fingerstyle guitar player alive in the 1960s who did <u>not</u> study with the Rev. Gary Davis. He also never claimed to have been at or even considered going to Woodstock. This level of honesty obviously disqualifies him from holding any elected office.

Although Mike resisted entering mainstream society, eventually he worked his way through college and settled down with a real job. Ever restless, he took up rock climbing, sea kayaking, canoeing, and woodworking to escape the tedium of the white-bread suburban lifestyle. He has now settled down to much tamer pursuits—riding and training horses. He is getting much better at the horse thing; his unscheduled dismounts are becoming a thing of the past and aren't even worth mentioning – so they will not be mentioned. He's got a big diesel truck with West Virginia tags, a horse trailer, and of course, a horse to prove it.

But through it all, there's been one constant—playing music. Mike first took up guitar in his teens, and later the banjo and mandolin. He has a wide range of musical influences from Pat Donohue to Mike Dowling ("wide range" being a relative term). It is rumored he did spend time with Fuzzy Mandeville during the winter of 1969 learning the guitar chops he so deftly displays today, even at his now advanced age. For his showcase, rumor has it he will play a Bach cantata, a fugue from Mozart's Requiem in D minor, Bill Monroe's version of *Working on a Building, Wild Thing* by the Troggs plus a few other surprises.

And, as the song says, "He never told one lie that was not his own".

Stacey Earle and Mark Stuart met for the first time 1991 at a songwriters night in Nashville TN. They knew that night it was one of them things that are just meant to be. They were married in 1992 while raising 2 children from Stacey's first marriage. Stacey Earle's first show was on an arena stage in Sydney, playing rhythm guitar in her brother's band. Stacey appeared on Steve Earle and The Dukes recordings, "The Hard Way" in 1990, "Shut Up And Die Like An Aviator" in 1991, and "Transcendental Blues" in 2000. She spent about a year and a half on tour with her brother, and then returned to Nashville to start a career of her as country/folk own а

singer/songwriter. It was there she found she had a lot more to learn, a risk to take and a lot of dues to pay. She would later land a Staff writing position with the Publishing Company Ten Ten Music. She will tell you it is an art in itself to write for other artist, but before that she would meet her husband Mark Stuart. "I learned almost all the best of my musicianship from Mark exploring a wide range of influences, from blues to folk to rockabilly to country. Between the two of us we had a lot to show and tell. We still learn from each other day in and out. A great songwriter and musician never should stop learning."

Mark Stuart went to the finest of Music schools. Mark started his schooling listening and admiring his uncle's guitar playing and his Dads fiddling. Learning and listening to the greats, Chet Atkins, Merle Travis, John Fogerty, The Beatles and many more Players and singers of all genres. He would find himself playing in the School of Honky Tonks and Beer Joints in and around Nashville by age 15 in his Dad's band. By managing to stay awake in high school after playing late nights polishing every riff and bend and vocal chord he would go on by age 17 to form his own band, make a record and still find the time to play on the road as lead guitar and vocals for acts like Freddy Fender and more taking him into his 20's. Mark truly never in his life ever said there was nothing else he wanted to be when he grew up. He is truly one to live and breathe every word he says. Mark was in off the road when he met Stacey and that very night that he would play the first note of her music never leaving her side. Mark still somehow found the time to work on his own music recording his solo record and touring. And the love of his new family, Mark as well spent some time in the Dukes in the 1990s. Like Earle, he recalls it as a time of glamour, appearing on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno," and MTV. "I had someone tuning my guitar, strapping on my guitar," he said. They've gone on to release their Duo albums: "Never Gonna Let You Go" in 2003, "S&M Communion Bread" in 2005 and "Love from Stacey and Mark" in 2008 on Gearle Records. In addition, each remains an individual solo artist with Mark Stuart's "Left of Nashville" and Stacey Earle's "The Ride" due later 2008.

Stacey and Mark will be joining us right after their latest international tour of England, The Netherlands, Germany and Ireland. Folk music publications have been lauding them for the past year. Let's get a chance to see why at The Folk Club!
