WHERE HAS ALL THE SINGING GONE?

By listening to rather than making music we've lost touch with a joyous experience

How would your friends react if at your next party you suggested gathering around the piano for a sing-along? With amazement? Distaste? Horror?

What seems like an unusual suggestion at a party today was a natural and welcome part of socializing for many Americans just 40 or 50 years ago. That fact is that "we don't have a singing culture in America the way we used to," says the University of Maryland's Daphne Harrison in the NEW YORK TIMES (April 24, 1991).

Although membership in choral groups is still strong, the TIMES reports, informal everyday singing is in a definite slump. But why the change in a nation where pioneers carried songbooks across the country in their wagons?

Technology is the real culprit, most experts agree. With radios, personal stereos, compact disc players, and all the other assorted and relatively inexpensive gadgets at our disposal, Americans have just become more accustomed to listening to music than to making it.

And that's a shame, observes German jazz writer, author, and producer Joachim-Ernst Berendt, who claims that singing can make you feel as good as sex. Berendt, who produced the three-CD set Voices: A Compilation of the World's Greatest Choirs (Mesa, also available on cassette), hypothesizes in ROLLING STONE (June 13, 1991) that "The basic situation of modern man is being separated from nature, from the universe, from other people. And there are just a few media to overcome this separation". Meditation and love are two; the other, he claims, is singing. "That's why people love to sing in choirs," he says. "This feeling of unity, of oneness...is a spiritual experience usually you only have in love".

efits of music one step further, is convinced that singing can be healing as well as unifying. Last New Year's Eve, he organized a 24-hour chant and meditation at San Francisco's Grace Cathedral that was aimed at "healing in mind, body, and spirit."

Using music as a healing force is a long-held interest of McFerrin's, reports NEW AGE JOURNAL (March/April 1991), but he "didn't start thinking of it consciously until [he] became a singer and found that there were times, after a really good sing, [when] it was like running energy, really good, positive energy. When you're singing," he explains, "you're employing the breath in a rhythmic way. It can do a lot to slow your thought process down."

With all these benefits (could singing even replace therapy?), is there hope for a revival of informal group singing in America? Mitch Miller thinks so: "People are just dying for a chance to sing," he told the TIMES. And McFerrin fervently hopes so: "We're losing touch with a really valuable part of ourselves, which is our ancestral memory - the genetic memory of the old songs, the old chants, the old rhythms." On a more prosaic level, there's the reason music teacher Naomi Flanders gives for why singing should be revived: "It's fun. And it makes you feel good."
