Dean Blehert's poetry is fresh. Some pieces are written minutes before he stands to perform them. His titles signal the audience to expect the unusual: Taco Bell's Canon, On My Stool, and My Name Is Dean And I'm A Bobbiholic. At the microphone, Dean is both deliberate and relaxed. He is university-professor patient, reading from his notes and pausing to look up and acknowledge response. In over thirty years of writing and performing poetry, Dean has learned to gauge response. "I want the poem," he explains, "to create an effect."

Dean Blehert has become the Folk Club's Poet-At-Large in part because of his unconventional viewpoint, sometimes posed as a question: Why do we have two nostrils instead of one? Do our pets think of us in sensual terms? and, What if I'd never occupied a body before and I suddenly came upon a world like this one where everyone else did?

"It all starts with the way I see something," Dean says. "Then I want to communicate what I see. That decision to try and communicate spawns creativity. At that point, I ask myself, Where am I as a writer, and who am I supposed to talk to?"

In the Folk Club, Dean found a non-poetry audience actually attentive to his writing. He has performed his work in bars and entered poetry slams in DC. Dean says the key to success in those settings is your material.

"It's important to do things that people will get. Humor can help with this and sometimes things are accidentally funny. I've also found that shorter pieces work better. People don't have the patience to hear a five page poem performed."

Ten years ago, Dean developed a poetry publication called *Denotations*. He still produces six issues a year for 400 subscribers. To other poets considering submitting material, Dean promises "I will consider poetry written in any form, both serious and humorous, of any length on any subject. I only require that it be written by Dean Blehert."

Each issue of *Denotations* starts with a letter to the reader. In issue 16, Dean uses this space to ask a question and provide advice to anyone who performs for an audience. "What makes me think I can write enough readable poems to keep this thing going all by myself? In fact, I can't. Fortunately, I'm not here all by myself. You're here to."

TM Hanna Showcases In July

- Q: When did you first get interested in music?
- TM I've always been interested. I started teaching myself to play guitar in high school. I was writing songs and wanted to hear how they would sound with music.
- Q: How did you end up becoming a member of the Folk Club?
- TM I kept hearing announcements on the radio about people who were playing here. So I came over and then later I got up the courage to actually perform.
- Q: Who are your musical influences?
- TM I have a fairly diverse background. I used to listen to *The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band*, especially their early stuff, when it was more of a jug band. They did a lot of different styles with the same five people.

- Q: Do you still write songs?
- TM Oh yeah, I do a lot of writing with Eric Forthman. We get together about once a week. Because Eric can play just about anything, we can pretty much write in any style we want.
- Q: How does that work? Collaboration I mean.
- TM Well, writing with Eric is really good. He has a very strong sense of meoldy, a good feel for the music. The great thing about writing with someone else is you get immediate feedback on a tune. It helps to minimize your own excesses.
- Q: So how does a song start for you?
- TM Usually with a phrase, either one or two lines. That develops into the chorus or a verse. The rest of the tune can take 20 minutes or 20 years, it just depends on the song.
