

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# February 11 Showcase - Eric Sommer

Eric Sommer was born in Boulder, grew up in Southeast Asia, first got serious about music in Denmark, lives in DC, and thinks of the Boston area as home. He currently has two businesses, doing marketing and communications (with Lotus and Netscape among his clients) and sales force lead generation, but for most of his life Eric has been a professional musician.



A USIS function in Bangkok, Thailand, was Eric's first public performance - at age seven, while his family was there with the State Department. He also performed at the Trolley in Bangkok, and after moving to Lexington, Massachusetts, in the late 60's, he hung out at Passim's and The Plow and the Stars. After some college, Eric set off hitching around Europe, and found himself broke but with a guitar in Aarhus, Denmark. He made his living performing there at Gabarie and Den Hoi, and to this day hates the peppermint schnapps that everyone drank.

Returning to Boston in 1973, Eric hooked up with Don Law Productions, and through them and others he was booked to open for and/or perform with a wide range of people, including Buddy Guy & Junior Wells, Dave Van Ronk, Spider John Koerner, the Byrds, Little Feat w/Lowell George, David Bromberg, Leon Redbone, John Mayall and the Bluesbreakers (on the *Room to Move* tour), Cap'n Swing (later to become the Cars), the James Montgomery Blues Band, and the Dead Kennedys. During most of this time Eric was a solo act, but he also appeared with a pickup band called Sparky and the Blades, and fronted The Atomics, a progressive rock power trio (guitar, bass, and drums).

Musical influences include Bill Staines, Bert Jansch, Davey Graham, the Cars, Elvis Costello, the Allman Brothers, Steve Howe, and Brian May. Another major influence was Mick Goodrich, a guitarist for the Gary Burton Quartet and Eric's instructor at the Berklee College of Music from 1976-78.

Eric came to DC in 1982, and later took some time off from music. He started playing again a year and a half ago, and finds getting back to music to be great fun. When asked if he had any messages for our extensive readership, he said he wanted us to be clear that he hates Kathy Lee Gifford, that he wants to work for world peace, and that his favorite color is blue.

Don't miss Eric's showcase, it promises to be very entertaining!

# **LUCY KAPLANSKY**

Since her career's beginning, critics have envisioned a big future for singer-songwriter Lucy Kaplansky. John Rockwell of the New York Times was the first, observing that it would be easy to predict stardom for her. When you hear her sing, his reasoning becomes clear. She has a voice unlike anyone else recording today. It is fluid, agile, and strong, and when she joins it with another, as she does with Shawn Colvin on The Tide, the harmonies are delightful. Lucy's crucial influences came from the voices of Mary McCaslin and Cindy Mangsen, and from her collaboration

with Emmylou Harris and Gram Parsons, who continue to influence her work today.

Lucy began her career singing in Chicago, but has long been a fixture of the Greenwich Village music scene. She made her mark as a Folk City regular, as part of the Fast Folk Co-op crowd, and with Song Project, a group which earned critical acclaim. In those days Lucy was sharing the stage with colleagues who attained significant popularity, including Nanci Griffith, John Gorka, Suzanne Vega, the McGarrigle Sisters, and Shawn Colvin. Lucy and Shawn performed as a duo for years, and Lucy appeared on Shawn's Grammy-winning debut, Steady On, on Griffith's Lone Star State of Mind, and on three of Gorka's albums. Lucy also landed soundtrack credits singing with Vega on Pretty in Pink, and with Griffith on The Firm.

Lucy's latest album, The Tide, is a great collection of songs, including three stellar originals and others penned by some of her favorite artists: Richard Thompson, Bill Morrissey, Cliff Eberhardt, Robin Batteau and Sting.

## Rhythm 101

As you listen to music in "standard" 4/4 time (you can count it out 1 + 2 + 3 + 4 +, etc), the **downbeat** refers to beats 1 and 3, and the **backbeat** refers to beats 2 and 4. Try clapping along to some recorded music, and you'll find that the backbeat - the 2 and 4 - are the accented beats in almost all cases. It sounds and feels best to clap on those beats (it actually sounds sort of Wonder Bread bad to clap on the 1 and 3; Sparky Rucker, for example, made gentle fun of people who clap "on the beat," as he called the downbeat).

The exceptions to this general rule are traditional Irish music, in which clapping on the downbeat is normal (although a migration toward the backbeat is evident as Irish music becomes more Americanized), and marches such as John Philip Sousa's, in which you might as well clap on all the beats.

A fun variation to the standard backbeat is to clap four times per measure like this: one and two and three and four and one and two and three and four and one and two and three and four and...

(think of the intro to My Boyfriend's Back by the Shangri Las... Enjoy!)
