August 12 Showcase - Space Time Gourmets



A NOT NEARLY BRIEF ENOUGH HISTORY OF THE SPACE TIME GOURMETS

The birth of the Space Time Gourmets has recently been traced to a mountainside near New Market, Virginia, one holiday weekend when several of us had gathered at the Hurd Place to relax and play some music. Blair Shepard, who was to later become known affectionately as "Blair," offered to learn one of TM Hannas' original songs. He reckoned it certainly couldn't sound any worse and about that time Brian Gilmartin, who had brought along a bass and was not afraid to use it, joined in and sang harmony to boot. Well friends, they played that song into the dirt but they decided to keep right on playing, so they got together and rehearsed the Monday evening that followed. Not being ones to put off anything that

redistributes the sonic relationships of the surroundings, they debuted the next night at a place that rarely uses its acronym (to avoid legal obstifications hereafter to be known as the Faux Club.)

And what a debeau it was. Eric Forthman was quick to point out to the lads after the show that he couldn't help notice that they needed a guitar player and it might as well be him. They rehearsed on a fairly regular schedule for a while, sorta using the name Better Than We Sound, until Blair went out of town on business one week and came back to find out the name had been changed by and to the Space Time Gourmets. For a short while the lovely and talented Liberty Rucker played fiddle for us before moving to Maryland where she makes fine quality Celtic-flavored folk stuff. During this period TM and Eric began writing songs together. All too soon, Brian, the rock steady boom, boom, boom on the lower end, the melting blending harmony on the top of the vocals, and the guy who let the band rehearse at his house, announced he was moving to Arizona and for a brief moment there it appeared that he might invite the band to go along, but it did not happen and Blair moved back to New York and that left two. About this time TM and Eric had been playing any place they could find and writing more songs. It seems the harder they worked at it the less fun it became and they played together less and less. TM wanted to record some of the songs before he forgot them. He went into the studio, but got somewhat sidetracked for a few years. The project originally titled "the Last of the Space Time Gourmets" was released earlier this month on Birdphluph Music as "Good Things Take Time." Eric

stopped by for a session or two and gradually they began to play together again. TM ran into Fritzi one ice cold February Thursday, at Fanny and Melinda's mic in Arlington, and some time later she met Eric while performing a song with him one night at the Faux Club. It was a song TM had written and he was there too. Recently, Fritzi decided to take a break from performing, leaving two again.

Is this the final chapter for the Space Timers, or just another loop in the revolving evolution? Swansong or regenysis? Will they find a bass player or will they have to settle for an old time banjo player in Arizona and a rehearsal twice a decade? As long as they still perform Gilbert and Sullivan in Poughkeepsie (just to keep their vocal chords in shape), we suspect that they can never be completely counted out, though possibly redirected.

Who cares, if it happens, it happens. They claim to be the reason for some of the rules around here at the Folk Club of Reston-Herndon (FCRH). Somebody set the timer!

So here they are, the Space Time Gourmets!



Andrew McKnight is a singer, songwriter, guitarist and poet from the Blue Ridge foothills of Virginia. His debut CD *Traveler* has received critical acclaim and airplay nationwide, leading to performances at the 1996 Summer Olympic Games. Featuring his vivid imagery, evocative guitar work, and songs that draw out "the extraordinary details in ordinary things," highlighting people and places from Appalachia to the rural west, *Traveler* has put Andrew on the map and on the road. His dynamic and literate style frequently invokes comparisons with Americana artists like John Mellancamp and Pierce Pettis. Andrew weaves a homegrown understanding of rural and small town America with threads of spirituality, optimism, and imagery into a diverse musical fabric

drawn from folk, blues, country, and world music. Truly an engaging performer and a captivating persona, Andrew is quickly finding his way into venues and CD collections all across America.



- fill out a lottery slip any time in the month before the drawing
- win the drawing (held on the night of the previous month's showcase); and


