December 11 Showcase – Jane Sparks Tatum

ane Tatum's lovely voice was first heard in public when she sang at the First Baptist Church in her hometown of Olive Hill, Kentucky. She was in second grade. By sixth grade, she had joined the adult choir, and has been singing choral music ever since, in Latin, German, French, and Italian as well as English. She loves and sings blues and jazz, but the church is where she got her start, and has been a constant musical thread in her life. Jane moved to the area in 1990 when her husband became minister at the Fair-Park Baptist Church, on Quaker Lane in Alexandria. She sings there, of course, but has focused her music at the Folk Club, too, for the last four years. In the chorus, her alto voice is almost never the solo, but at the Folk Club, happily, it is.

In Olive Hill, Jane's Dad listened to the Grand Old Opry and Lester Flatt & Earl Scruggs, and as a kid she hated it. It wasn't until she was in high school that Jane went to her first bluegrass festival, and got hooked. She saw guys hobble up on stage with canes, sit down laboriously, and then pick up a fiddle or a banjo - and effortlessly fly. Hooked! Add bluegrass to her list of influences, along with folk, country, and the Southern spiritual tradition.

Jane was the second of seven children in the Sparks family - John, Jane, Jack, Janet, Jean, Julia, and James. As the oldest girl, she was big sister to, and helped raise, most of them. The one that she looked up to, her mentor, tutor, and protector - her big brother John - lost a battle with cancer in 1998, and Jane sought to create a memorial to him and the rest of her family. The result is a serenely beautiful recording, *How Sweet the Sound: Songs of Hope & Faith*, a collection of spiritual songs that she's been singing for over 30 years, plus one song she learned specifically for this project - the Servant Song, from

the 1844 Sacred Harp songbook. The CD features Folk Club friends Mike Ball on guitar and banjo; Les Thompson, recording engineer and co-producer; Jim Houck on bass; and Ron Goad on percussion. Also featured are Loudoun County musicians Danny Knicely on guitar, and Dave Van Deventer on fiddle and tin whistle. Jane's goal was to create a comforting tribute, and the result is a dignified, uplifting, and highly satisfying collection of songs, with musicianship and production that wonderfully frame Jane's voice. Beautiful!

For her showcase, Jane will feature songs from *How Sweet the Sound* along with other selections. She'll be accompanied by Mike Ball and perhaps a mystery guest or two. Don't miss a special night at the Folk Club.

On most Tuesday evenings, the Folk Club is an open mike format with a sign-up board. Each performer has 12 minutes, including setup time. This allows three songs if you set up FAST and the songs are of moderate length.

Showcase Performances

On the second Tuesday of each month, we feature a Folk Club member in a two set (25-minute) "Showcase" performance. To be in a showcase you must:

- be a Folk Club member who has not done a showcase in 6 months
- fill out a lottery slip any time in the month before the drawing
- win the drawing on the night of the current month's showcase
- prepare to be featured in the next newsletter!

Folk Club members are encouraged to submit performance calendars, classified advertisements, articles, reviews, artwork and other music related items to Irene Boyer at irene@caboyer.com. All items must be emailed in MSWord, WordPerfect, or ASCII text format. Information must be received one week before the first day of the month in which you want it published.
