May 14 Showcase - Fred Daniels

red Daniels grew up in Arlington, Virginia, and went to Washington-Lee High School. He was an athlete, wrestling and playing football and baseball, and didn't pay much attention to music until he was intrigued by a girl playing Puff the Magic Dragon. Fred decided to take guitar lessons, and told the teacher at Arlington Music he wanted to learn some pop standards. His teacher said, OK, we'll get to that, but first let's do a little of this - and taught him Mississippi John Hurt's Spike Driver's Moan. They went on to more complex fingerstyle ragtime pieces, and Fred was hooked. He stopped doing athletics and mostly played guitar. He credits that teacher - Paul Reisler - with changing his life. A few years later, when Paul left the music store, Fred became its new guitar instructor.

At William and Mary, Fred played in a rock band for four years. Back in this area after college, he played in and sang lead for a Top 40 band called Sunrise, and then traveled the East Coast with a jazzy show band. His next musical incarnation was as a one-man band, playing and singing along to prerecorded drum, guitar, vocal, and other tracks, and

using a PA that he built himself. He and a partner then opened a recording studio directly above Chuck Levin's Washington Music Center in Maryland, but that folded when all the equipment was stolen.

At this point Fred got married, and stopped playing for twenty years. He has three children, ages 12 to 20, that he's raising as a single parent since his wife - his old high school sweetheart - died of cancer six years ago. He also owns a business called Fitness Fleet, which brings a personal trainer and a mobile gym to clients' homes or other locations. All this keeps him quite busy, but when his church learned that he was a musician several years ago, he was recruited to play bass, and then guitar. Fred is now fully immersed in music again. He learned about the Folk Club when he saw **Ray Kaminsky** at the Tyson's Borders store, stopped by for a visit, and loves the club's supportive atmosphere.

Fred is planning an eclectic performance, ranging from Mary Chapin Carpenter's *Jubilee* to Louis Prima's *Banana Split for my Baby*, with some Dylan, and more, thrown in. He'll be accompanied by **Charlton Ho** on flute. Don't miss this showcase!

Tuesday, June 4, at the Folk Club



Michelle Swan & Jerry Bresee

Jerry Bresee is a songwriter from Northern Virginia with a rich baritone voice and a jazz and swing-influenced sound. Jerry Bresee lives two lives, one as a musician, and one as an aviation psychologist. As a songwriter, Jerry's music touches audiences through his lyrics and his folk/swing grooves. His music reaches his peers as well, as evidenced by four WAMMIE nominations from the Washington Area Music Association including 2 for Best Male Vocalist in Contemporary Folk. That music has its roots in the views of a thoughtful person caught up in the workaday world who comes up for air now and then, and looks around. Combine this outlook with a strong and driving style of guitar playing, a taste for the occasional jazz chord, and an edgy baritone voice, and you get a fresh look at what most of us face when we get up in the morning. As a psychologist, Jerry spends his time working with airlines and the FAA to develop new training programs for airline pilots. These two lives intersect in his unique brand of acoustic music in songs like "Airborne" and "Flying Home", and Jerry often takes his music "on the road," performing at venues in the cities where he travels. All those hours on airplanes provide lots of time for writing songs, including those found on his latest release Lifeline and his standout 1997 debut recording, Skylight.

Introduced to the guitar at age nine by her father, himself a former singer/songwriter, Michelle Swan has pursued a musical path ever since. After studying classical musical at Towson State University, Michelle entered the Baltimore-Washington music scene in 1990, performing at local open-mic's and coffeehouses at such venues as Fire & Water in Massachusetts; the Folkal Point; the Takoma Park Folk Festival; The Frederick Festival of the Arts, Women & Their Music Festival in Hartford, Connecticut; Iota; and The Virginia Women's Music Festival near Charlottesville. Classifying herself as an "Urban Acoustic Singer/Songwriter," Michelle's influences includes artists as divergent as Cheryl Wheeler, Cat Stevens, and Lucinda Williams, but her performances center around her own compositions, displaying both a prolific talent for song writing and an infectious love of music. Self-reflective and acutely observant, Michelle deftly weaves lyric and note together to create intensely personal songs that tell of sentiments and circumstances nonetheless familiar to everyone. Michelle's debut CD, "Whistling in the Dark", was released in May 2000 and nominated for the Washington Area Music Association's "WAMMIE" award for "Best Debut Recording" of 2000. Her peers also nominated her for "Best New Artist" in 1998. Michelle was a finalist in the 2001 Mid-Atlantic Songwriting Competition for her song "Not That I'd Know". Michelle is currently back in the studio working on her second project with Marco Delmar. The new CD is due out this

On most Tuesday evenings, the Folk Club is an open mike format with a sign-up board. Each performer has 12 minutes, including setup time. This allows three songs if you set up FAST and the songs are of moderate length.

Showcase Performances

On the second Tuesday of each month, we feature a Folk Club member in a two set (25-minute) "Showcase" performance. To be in a showcase you must:

- be a Folk Club member who has not done a showcase in 6 months
- fill out a lottery slip any time in the month before the drawing
- win the drawing on the night of the current month's showcase
- prepare to be featured in the next newsletter!

Folk Club members are encouraged to submit performance calendars, classified advertisements, articles, reviews, artwork and other music related items to Irene Boyer at irene@caboyer.com.
