November 12 Showcase-NINA ANMHIAN By

Nina Anmahian has been a front-row heckler in the cheap seats at the Folk Club for many years, but doesn't usually perform. Every now and then, though, she throws her name in the showcase bucket and wonders what'll turn up. Well, this time she finally did it, she won the Big Taco and brought home the coveted Resplendent Quetzal Folk Club Soapbox Showcase slot for November!

OK, then, what will she do? People have wondered, of course, if she has any musical abilities, or if she gets by merely on her sharp intellect, quick wit, charming personality, ravishing good looks, and amazing hands. Does she Sing? Play? Dance? The answer is.... <drumroll> ... Yes, Yes, and Yes! Her musical beginnings go way back to when she was a wee tyke, and she's played piano for many years. She's tried to strap her Yamaha upright on her back to bring it to the Club, but could never get it out the door, so she picked up the recorder a few years ago. Much easier to hoist than the piano! Many of you will remember her recorder quartet, Simple Gifts Ensemble, at last year's October showcase. They play music from the 15th through 19th centuries, from Susato through Handel, Mozart, and Beethoven, and explore the 20th century with selections from the Shakers, barbershop quartets, Scott Joplin, and more. Their CD, "Musical

History Tour" will, of course be available at the showcase.


But it's not the Ensemble that will be playing on November 12. For this showcase, Nina has invited an eclectic mix of her other friends to join her. She's not telling in advance what people and instruments will show up, but players of didjeridoo, shawm, Theremin, highland pipes, dino-bones, vibraphone, flugelhorn, koto, Chapman stick, diddly bow, washboard, and triangle are all possible. In fact, vibrating strings of all lengths, vibrating tubes of all sizes, vibrating membranes and resonators of all contours, and anything that can be plucked, blown, bowed, plonked, or otherwise cajoled into vibrating are likely to be featured.


So, don't miss Nina's surprise showcase - if you have vibration potential, and are cajolable, you might become part of the act yourself!

Sarah Lee Guthrie & Johnny Irion

Sarah Lee Guthrie was born into the first family of American folk music in the colorful Berkshire Hills of western Massachusetts. As the youngest daughter of world-renowned folksinger Arlo Guthrie and granddaughter of the legendary Woody Guthrie, Sarah Lee grew up with music as a part of her everyday life experience. With a close family that extended from her parents Arlo and Jackie to her mentors, Pete Seeger, Ramblin' Jack Elliot and Hoyt Axton and many others, the youngest Guthrie found herself in the spotlight as a third generation singer/songwriter.

"On her solo debut, this third-generation folkie straddles the styles her family made famous. Dad Arlo's hippie musings are echoed in the Indian-flavored River, while grandpa Woody's more fiery persona is evident in the bouncy Lazy Tongue. But when Sarah finds her own groove on the languid Johnny by My Side it's clear she can prick up our ears even without her name."

Johnny Irion originates from a family of artists. His grandfather, Fred Knight, a tenor singer, was cast as the lead in the traveling Broadway show, "Oklahoma". His grandmother, Rubilee Knight is a classical violinist. His uncle, Thomas Steinbeck, son of John Steinbeck, writes books and screenplays. Having been surrounded by music all of his life, then exposed to great literature by his uncle, writing and performing was a natural progression for him. In 1999, Johnny partnered with Sarah Lee Guthrie and Tao Rodriguez-Seeger Using their last names, they formed the folk trio RIG. In the last year Johnny and Sarah Lee have been performing together as a duo. In between playing in RIG, with Sarah Lee, and backing Arlo Guthrie, he also tours doing solo shows in support of his new release *Unity Lodge*.

On most Tuesday evenings, the Folk Club is an open mike format with a sign-up board. Each performer has 12 minutes, including setup time. This allows three songs if you set up FAST and the songs are of moderate length.

Showcase Performances

On the second Tuesday of each month, we feature a Folk Club member in a two set (25-minute) "Showcase" performance. To be in a showcase you must:

- be a Folk Club member who has not done a showcase in 6 months
- fill out a lottery slip any time in the month before the drawing
- win the drawing on the night of the current month's showcase
- prepare to be featured in the next newsletter!
