

FCN: So who will be joining you at your showcase?
TM: It's still a week away so it's a little early to know for sure what I'll play or with whom, but I'm hoping to be joined by Jerry Daniels and Larry Tapper (of whom few photographs are known to exist.)

FCN: Whom else have you played with?

TM: I have done a few solo gigs, but as a mandolin player I prefer a group. Over the past twelve years I've played with hundreds maybe thousands of folks at the Folk Club and other open mics, festivals, and the occasional paying gig. I've played with Doris Justis, Eddie Pockey, Mike Wilkinson, Bill Davis, The Wings of Truth, Flinchbaugh and Friends, Somos El Mar, The Porch Monkeys, Jeffry and the Fishermen, Pete Brown and the Mad Cows, The Justis League and of course, The Space Time Gourmets. The fact that many of the people I've played with no longer play music is just a coincidence.

FCN: TM besides playing at the Folk Club for the last twelve years where else have you played?

TM: Well, Mark's Pub, St. Elmo's, Brookside Gardens, Zigs, McKeever's, On the Border, Scrooples, Luna Park Grille, The Avalon Resort, The Swamp Circle Saloon, The Kensington Coffeehouse, The Open Door Coffeehouse, Ledo's, American Legion Post 85, The Bluemont Fair, lota, the Barefoot Pelican, Okra's, Revolution, Bennigan's, the Carpenter Street Saloon, The Down Under, Blackbeard's, Mom's, TGIFridays, Café Monet, several Starbucks, a dozen churches, three retirement homes, a wedding, and countless open mics and jam sessions, and I'm sure I've left a few out. The fact that many of these venues no longer have live music is merely a coincidence.

FCN: Who are some of the songwriters that have influenced you the most?

TM: A few that come to mind, with an emphasis on lyricists, since when I first started writing, I studied successful lyricists of the past hundred years or so. I'm sure I'll leave off a few and there's some who have inspired me as a performer more than as a writer, but here goes in no particular order; Shel Silverstein, Bill Danoff, Johnny Cash, Gus Kahn, Ager & Yellin, Stephen Foster, Danny O'Keefe, George Work, Elijah Root, Dylan, Denver, Prine, Steve Goodman, Woody Guthrie, Jackson Browne, Paul Simon, Paul McCartney, Kristofferson, Beaudleaux & Felice Bryant, Mark Graham, Ernest Tubb, Hal David, Jim & Van Morrison, Michael Smith, Merle Haggard, Jimmy Ibbotson, George Harrison, Warren Zevon, Keith Reid, Eric Bogle, Eric Andersen, Ian Anderson, Ian Tyson, Peter Yarrow, Randy Newman, Carole King, Dolly Parton, Lowell George, JD Souther, Frank Zappa, Rodney Crowell, Tom Waits, Greg Brown, Tom Paxton, Tom T. I realize that many of these people no longer write songs, it's not a coincidence, many of them are dead. There are others who have inspired me as a performer or instrumentalist, but there isn't space to get into that.

Paul Geremia's performances are a blend of acoustic guitar (six and 12string), vocals, harmonica, sometimes piano. With these "tools" he creates music which is sometimes smooth and intricate, sometimes rough and hard-edged depending on how he chooses to interpret his material. Whatever song he chooses from his prodigious repertoire, his main objective is to put a song across to an audience, whether they be knowledgeable blues fans or average listeners. These songs vary from oldtime country blues and early jazz of people like Blind Lemon Jefferson, Robert Johnson, Scrapper Blackwell and Blind Blake, to his many original compositions.

The originals strongly reflect earlier music. This is not so much a function of intent, as it is just a logical outgrowth of having assimilated many sounds over the years which fit together like a musical jig-saw puzzle. For over thirty years, Paul Geremia has been surviving solely by the fruit of his musical labors. Having abandoned all other means of support in 1966, he has been traveling far and wide in the U.S.A. ever since, while performing in every capacity from street singing to exclusive club and concert bookings. He is almost as well known in Europe, Canada and England where he has toured on numerous occasions. During these years, Geremia crossed paths with people whose influences were beneficial to his development and understanding of the tradition. He worked as opening act for some of the early blues "legends" thereby gaining an immeasurable depth of knowledge from people like Babe Stovall, Yank Rachel, Son House, Skip James, Howlin' Wolf, and many others, especially Pink Anderson whose career he helped revitalize.

Geremia has recorded ten solo albums, and has appeared on numerous anthologies and compilation discs. His superb recordings have made him a critical favorite and place him firmly among the legends who inspired and influenced him over the past three decades.

MUSICAL NOTES

As some of you may already know, my brother Dave Lafleur has moved back to the area, after living and performing in New York and Florida for way too long. The family is delighted to have him back. Dave has taken to living in the family cabin in WV. When the need for music, or a Starbuck's frappaccino takes over, he comes down from the mountain to the metro area. Looking for gigs in the Charles Town area, he ran into Cheryl, who is opening the Full Circle Café in Keedysville. Here is how she tells it.

Kate and I are working with Yvonne of the Full Circle Cafe in Keedysville. We plan to do a regular concert on Saturday nights, open mic on Fridays and whatever strikes us or comes along on other nights.

The River House Concert series has been "on the road" for a while, so the Full Circle will give a new home to all the music. At the Full Circle we're planning to do a River House Concert each Saturday beginning in January. Eventually folks will just know that they can come on down to the Full Circle for some great food and great music on any given Saturday. The cafe is just 10 minutes outside of Shepherdstown, WV in a little town called Keedysville, MD. The music starts November 22nd. We normally charge \$10/person. Dianne, that should give you an idea of what we've got in mind.
