February 17 Showcase – Kathy Martin (note: Showcase will be at 9:00 PM)

Kathy Martin has a lovely voice and a remarkable range. She first sang on stage at the age of ten, and has been gracing the world with her talent ever since.

An Air Force brat, Kathy lived in New Jersey, New Mexico, Okinawa, Montana, California, and Bangkok before settling in the DC area. She sang choir solos and folk mass at her church, and then ventured out to open mikes in the 1970s, at places like Gallagher's Pub and Eskimo Nell's.

These turned into paying gigs, and for a dozen years she was a solo act in the DC area, doing demo and commercial vocals as well as performing live. She then teamed up with Holly Garber and Lou Pfrang as a trio for another five years.

In 1990, Kathy skipped out to Las Vegas, where she found fewer live performance venues than in DC. Karaoke was a big thing, though, so she made money winning contests, and recorded background vocals for Vegas acts by Madonna and Michael Jackson impersonators. She also started her own open mike at the Glass Pool, a location featured in a ZZ Top video.

After returning to this area, Kathy reunited with Lou Pfrang, and along with Bobby Flurie on guitar they perform as *The River*. They have a semi-regular gig at O'Donnell's in Gaithersburg, and play at the Tarara Vineyard outside Leesburg during the summer. They have a private performance early in the evening on the 17th, which is why Kathy's showcase will start a bit later than normal.

By day, Kathy is an administrative assistant in SAIC's environmental unit. Six years ago she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis, which was probably present for several years earlier, as well. This has slowed her down some, but hasn't affected her voice.

Early influences on Kathy's singing were Linda Ronstadt and Carly Simon. In Junior High School she sang along with Barbra Streisand recordings, and learned guitar watching Glen Campbell's TV show. She now does an eclectic range of music, including Bonnie Raitt, Patsy Cline, Cheryl Crow, and Melissa Etheridge material, plus show tunes, blues and jazz. Don't miss it!

Internationally acclaimed JAMES "SPARKY" RUCKER is recognized as a leading folklorist, historian, musician, storyteller, and author. He has been singing songs and telling stories from the American tradition for over forty years. Sparky accompanies himself on guitar, banjo, and spoons, has released over eleven recordings. He has received numerous awards including the Storytelling World Award 2001, the Hurston-Hughes Award, John Henry awards in 1976 and 1982, and a nomination for the W.C. Handy Award for Best Traditional Artist.

RHONDA RUCKER, from Louisville, Kentucky, has played piano since the age of four, but it is on harmonica where she really shines. She began studying the techniques of Sonny Terry, the renowned blues harp player. She then branched out to other styles of playing. She has also studied with harmonica wizard Phil Wiggins. She began performing with Sparky in 1989. She has taught harmonica workshops and classes at numerous music camps and festivals. Her performing credits include the Kerrville Folk Festival, the Walnut Valley Festival in Winfield, Kansas, the Mississippi Valley Blues Festival, the Clearwater Folk Festival, the Vancouver Follk Festival, and the Robert Johnson Memorial Blues Festival.

The Ruckers contributed music to the syndicated television miniseries **The Wild West** (directed by Kieth Merrill). Sparky's unique renditions of John Henry and Jesse James were used in the **National Geographic Society's** 1994 video entitled Storytelling in North America. The Ruckers' passion for the American Civil War has inspired the development of **The Blue & Gray in Black & White**, a special historical program that tells stories from the war in music and narrative. "More songs came out of the Civil War than any other war in history," Sparky says. He is also currently researching Confederate General James Edward Rains, who had a promising political career before the war as editor of the Nashville Banner and Davidson County's attorney general. "Rains died gloriously leading a charge at the Battle of Stones River," he says. Another special historical program, The Buffalo, Eagle, and Silver Spur, tells the hidden history of the minorities in the American West. Sparky tells of the black soldiers who were nicknamed the "Buffalo Soldiers" by the Native Americans because of their resemblance to the highly regarded buffalo. His musical narrative also tells of the Ghost Dance warriors and the Mexican vaqueros. Sparky was given the "**Spirit of the Buffalo Soldier**" award for his research and presentation of this show in Arizona.

Sparky is a natural storyteller, having grown up hearing his father, uncles, and other family members endlessly telling tales. His storytelling is featured on Tall Tales of the Blue Ridge: Stories from the Heart of Appalachia, a video produced by the Eastern National Park & Monument Association in 1992. He has appeared at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesboro, Tennessee, the Festival of Storytelling on Martha's Vineyard, Motlow State Community College's Storytelling Festival, and the Texas Storytelling Festival. In 2000, he contributed to More Ready-To-Tell Tales, an anthology of stories from many of the nation's best professional storytellers. As a keynote speaker and a performer, Sparky Rucker has performed at such venues as the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. and the Chicago Cultural Center. He has also performed at major folk festivals, including Philadelphia, Smithsonian, Piccolo Spoletto (South Carolina), Vancouver, Winnepeg, Clearwater, Walnut Valley, Gürten-Bern (Switzerland), and the International Children's Festival at Wolf-Trap Farm Park.
